I want to thank

our graduating class of 2022 for their great contribution to the college academically, culturally socially and in terms of sports and extracurricular. I particularly want to mention the Green Campus committee responsible for the College achieving Green Campus Status with the flag being raised over the college on the 27th April 2022.

We are delighted that through the diligence of our staff and students and the demanding work of our Covid team, Dunboyne College has always been a safe place to attend each day. Special thanks to everyone that has contributed to this edition especially our tutors and journalism students and special thanks to our editor, Orla O'Dea, who is producing and editing this publication.

Our main highlight this year was the visit of Ministers Simon Harris, Helen McEntee and Damien English in December. During the visit Minister Simon Harris announced that his department have set aside funding for a new campus building on a green field site for Dunboyne College. It will be a FET College of the Future design and will be the first of its kind in the country. We are delighted by this announcement giving us state of the art, purpose-built facilities. Work is now ongoing procuring a site and finalising the business case for the size and scale of the development. This investment is a testament to our staff, students, and the schools and communities we serve, who have put their trust in us for so many years to help us grow to 1000 students, and become a centre of excellence for teaching and learning in this region.

Dunboyne College is a college with a family atmosphere which gives students a wealth of learning, enabling, communicating, collaborating, and inspiring each day. It is a comfortable and supportive place to learn. We are proud of our staff, our students and their achievements.

This year has seen record numbers progressing from our college to third level courses and directly to industry. Three

hundred and seventy-four (374) students received honours degree, Level 8 offers and two hundred and forty-eight (248) received a Level 7, ordinary degree offer. These figures do not include the many mature students who received early offers and those who took up offers in the UK for Nursing, Law or Sports degrees. In addition to these students, the majority of the students who studied on the vocational skills courses obtained employment, this is particularly relevant in the service and leisure courses.

Thank you for taking the time to read our newsletter and share in the many activities and events of recent weeks. Please keep an eye on our website, www.dunboynecollege.ie, and our Instagram, Facebook, LinkedIn and Twitter pages, which will keep you informed of events as they happen. The scholarships programme matches up a current Dunboyne College student with a company or organisation as that student's sponsor. The sponsor commits to, usually, reimbursing the college fees to the student upon successful completion of the academic year. Basically, each student gets a cheque at the graduation!

Horse Racing Ireland has committed to a €3,000 bursary for two students in the Equine area and this will be awarded at the end of the academic year.

The programme offers so many advantages to students like the opportunity to have their fees reimbursed for the academic year; the opportunity to form a relationship with a company or organisation in their vocational area and this may also translate into an opportunity for work experience or an internship and/or a reference for their CV.

New Initiative to Boost Skills and Boost Business Launched by Dunboyne College

A new initiative by Dunboyne College that will support employers to recruit, retain and upskill their employees was launched recently by Damien English TD, Minister for Business, Employment and Retail.

Skills to Advance funding is provides highly subsidized courses to employed people and employers. All courses are accredited at QQI Level 5 or 6 with most participants receiving 100% funding, meaning that there are no course fees. Classes are organized by Dunboyne College to be flexible to fit around business hours and work schedules.

The Minister also presented the first cohort of business people who took part in the pilot programme with their QQI certificates at an event in the Johnstown Estate Hotel and Spa. Employees from companies including Johnstown Estate, Trim Castle, The Hamlet Court Hotel, Bluebird Care, Home Instead, as well as individual employees from businesses across Meath completed courses with Dunboyne College in Training Needs, Training Delivery, Care Skills, Care of the Older Person, Excel, Front Office and Reception with Customer Service skills.

Acknowledging the commitment of LMETB and Dunboyne College to offering local businesses quality training Minister English said that more and more business owners and operators understand the additional impact that investing in their workforce has on their ability to grow and unlock new opportunities for their business.

Martin O’Brien, Chief Executive of Louth and Meath Education and Training Board (LMETB) said that LMETB was eager to support businesses to meet the challenges that they are facing. This view was echoed by Deis Leonard, Principal, Dunboyne College. “Our aim in delivering these programmes is to support local and regional employers by boosting skills which in turn will boost business.”

Anthony Smiddy, General Manager, Johnstown Estate says that the hotel used the training very effectively to upskill and train their senior management team. “The outcome was exceptional, by completing the QQI level 6 Special Purpose Award in Training and Development we have focused on the skills development of our staff. The experience embedded a culture of training across the hotel and the management team in turn have worked with their teams to identify additional training requirements. All this has had an impact on the quality of the service delivered to guests and on the business.”

RESPA Bedding in Oldcastle also engaged with Skills to Advance funding. Deirdre



Kelly, Operations Manager says its engagement brought a culture of learning and development to Respa Beds. As an employer it has allowed us to close skills gaps in the company, but more importantly it has opened doors for employees to engage in funded further education. LMETB funded courses have upskilled our employees in Lean Manufacturing, Safety and Health, Customs Training and Microsoft office skills. In addition to this, courses in English as a second language were provided onsite via the Skills for Work funding.”

Guidance Counselling

As the teaching year at DCFE nears the end a lot has been happening within the Guidance Department with many students seeking advice, information, guidance and counselling.

A major part of the career guidance service is the application process for progression to other universities and colleges both in Ireland and abroad. CAO time was extremely busy this year at DCFE from the time the application process opened on November 5th right through to February 1st with many hundreds of students seeking assistance on many levels of the application process. The QQI qualification gained at further education is a new route to progression for students providing huge opportunities alongside any other qualifications that they might have, such as a Leaving Certificate. The Higher Education Links Scheme is a system where students with a QQI qualification can apply through the CAO for a place from a quota of places set aside for the further education route. This year, Meabh and Derek in the Guidance Department assisted well over 600 students in this process.

Many students, particularly in the area of Nursing will apply to the UK universities through the UCAS system. This is a lengthier

application process involving a personal statement to be written by the applicant. This year the Guidance Department saw a large increase in applications to UCAS and assisted students through the process from application to offer stage. Mature student applications also kept the Guidance Department busy this year with an increase seen in this type of application.

The Guidance Department ran very successful information events for current students such as progression talks from different universities including Maynooth University, TU Dublin, UCD and DCU covering different types of degree options as well as apprenticeships. Students are continually updated through their DCFE email accounts of news and events such as university talks and open days.

Connecting with the schools in our catchment area has continued strongly right throughout the year with many schools inviting us back in on campus. This has been a welcomed change as meeting the prospective students face to face rather than online is so much more informative and interactive. This year, DCFE Guidance Department held for the first time a parent's information evening for prospective students which saw large numbers attend on campus for a great night. Meabh and Derek have also hosted information stands at the



many career expos in the region.

The other side of the Guidance Department is that of personal support and counselling. With the mix of the past few years of Covid and with other factors, many students feel the strain. Meabh and Derek have been crucial in supporting these students throughout the year both in getting back on track academically and in personal matters. Jigsaw delivered a DCFE college wide talk where all classes logged on for the invaluable information on the service and work provided for by Jigsaw. Thank you, Jigsaw.

32 DCFE students across many courses; Criminology, Liberal Arts and Computer Systems, to name but a few, took part in a 14-day internship in Girona, near Barcelona in Spain. Two staff members at DCFE; Adele McDermott (Healthcare Dept.) and Maria McDonnell (Business Dept.) accompanied the students on the second week to observe their progress. This Erasmus was funded by IEP and Corkscrew (innovative providers of internships and business start-up programs) - and facilitated by the staff and students here at Dunboyne college.

This international experience which took place from the 11th - 25th of February, focused on soft skills applied to



entrepreneurship and business start-up. Every day, there were workshops and group work for the students to get involved in. Extensive mentor support was available for idea development throughout the program by IEP and Corkscrew staff. In the evenings and weekends, students enjoyed exploring the wider Barcelona area and the sunny beaches just beside the hotel.

The program, in essence, is designed to leave students with a broad working knowledge of several key business areas: business, technical, professional and team working skills. This, in turn, enables students to focus on some very important and lifelong skills which will enhance, not only their career prospects, but indeed their ability to integrate better, and perform well in teams as well as solve problems.”

Both Frank and Greg then explained how calls are responded to, with instructive demonstrations on the handheld radio and the MDT in the Ambulance.

Local Authority Home Loan Scheme Welcomed with Open Arms

The new Local Authority Home Loan scheme has been welcomed in Meath, with many councillors hoping for locals to relish the opportunity to get their name out there onto the property ladder.

The Government-backed mortgage scheme is aimed at first-time buyers, and it will be open to 'fresh start' applicants – divorced or separated people who have no financial interests in the family home, or who have gone through the personal insolvency or bankruptcy route.

The scheme mainly puts itself forward for the purchase of new or second-hand residential properties and for self-builds under the Tenant Purchase Scheme and

Affordable Housing Schemes.

'The expansion of the council mortgage scheme to allow for a wider range of single people to purchase their own home is very welcome in Meath,' said Cathaoirleach of Meath County Council, Cllr Sean Drew.

'The scheme's fresh start component will open new opportunities for the eligible to move on with their own lives, and this gives them the ability to invest in a new or second-hand home.

'The increase of the single applicant income limit to €65,000 will let homeowners to be approved of a low interest mortgage under the scheme,' Cllr Drew added.

Cllr Nick Killian said the scheme would be one of solidarity and hope for single people and young people who want to buy a place they can call their own.

The new loan comes in the form of a normal capital and interest-gaining mortgage, which is repaid monthly via direct debit and

90% of the property's market value can be borrowed.

The maximum market values of properties that can be purchased or self-built account for: €320,000 in Meath and €250,000 in the rest of the country.

To qualify for the eligibility, a first-time buyer must be between the 18-70 age bracket, have a two-year continuous employment history as a primary earner or be in continuous employment for one year as a secondary earner.

A single applicant can have an annual gross income of not more than €65,000 in Meath or be under the earning of €50,000 in other counties.

Joint applicants must be in the possession of an annual gross income of not more than €75,000 in all counties.

Afghanistan: Inside Prison

Inside a prison in Afghanistan children as young as 12 are held and a female governor has vanished. Sky News exposes the insides of a Taliban jail in Herat where it is claimed to hold inmates without evidence, proof, or trials to their cases.

As reporters were given exclusive access to this prison, staggering secrets were revealed throughout their escort by the Taliban governor and his armed guards during their visit. The cells of Herat's main prison were discovered to be crammed full, confining an average of forty men to a small space with no room to move. This results in prisoners living in unhealthy, detrimental conditions as they are jammed up against one another on the floor, or some restricted to bunk beds.

The Herat prison chief, Mohammed Nabi Khali, admitted to the undercover prison he ran before the Taliban came to power last August. During that time, prisoners were continuously relocated in order to avoid the coalition raids. However, they've been locked up for five months

since. Those that were spoken to unveiled the truth about their lack of trials and judicial process. The governor himself stated that the launch of the city's Sharia court system had only been introduced a month ago. A prisoner in particular with a fresh injury on his arm explained how many are jailed are former government employees. The female head of Herat's woman prison, Alia Azizi, has also been reported missing for four months.

According to telephone records the last call she received was from the Herat prison governor. When he was interviewed, he insisted he had no idea what had happened to her, however he went on to say that he believed she was corrupt and stole the possessions of prisoners. He claimed she had run away to seek asylum in another country, stating that "If she was here, I would definitely know about it. The idea we are somehow responsible for her disappearance is fake." The Sky News team also witnessed

children as young as twelve inside these prisons and were informed the shocking truths about their crimes—some being as trivial as 'stealing bicycles' and remaining locked up whilst Taliban critics continue to disappear inside these jails, thus leaving critics in serious concern for those who hold the power over the country

The site is located at Castle Street in the Meath Town and it is being brought to market by Hooke and MacDonald which is guiding in excess of €1.65 million which is €91,500 per house. He splits his time between Lagos in Nigeria and the UAE and shares photos with his million Instagram followers.

Some of what he posts includes holding banknotes, staying at seven-star hotels and test-driving hypercars.

'Owning your own house is one of the best feelings ever. It cannot be described in words, it cannot be quantified in money,' he wrote after he bought Mompha Jr his first mansion as his sixth birthday present in 2019. 'Ownership of a home is a feeling that makes life's daily grindstone worth facing.

'It reassures you that after all the ups and downs you have a place to go to... A place

that will never judge you and always invite you with open arms...' 'Congrats My Son on your New Home. Ur (sic) birthday Gift from Daddy.'

Mustapha also claimed his son's life-changing achievements should receive their own acknowledgements. 'The youngest landlord who wears Gucci and still owns a house,' he said in a post on Instagram. 'He deserves some accolades cos (sic) he has paid his full dues.'

Mompha made his fortune from a bureau de change business located within Lagos before he decided to move into investments.

But as of January 2022, he has been accused of laundering more than £10 million.

A court heard claims from Nigeria's anti-corruption board that Mompha hid what he had earned in luxury designer watches.

He was held in custody to await a further trial hearing, and then he was released with the bail of £350,000.

As an African nation, Nigeria has had to put up with its own generation of Rich Kids of Instagram showing off their own private jets and possessions.

Is Animal Testing Ever Justified?

Is animal testing ever justified? The use of animal experimentation used in laboratories for medical procedures has been a topic of heated debate for decades—as despite the ultimate recognition of the breakthroughs they have introduced, including the developments of antibiotics like insulin therapy and modern anaesthesia, many people still object the use of animals in research environments as it denies their freedom and inflicts tremendous pain upon them. Unlike field research, which involves the observation of animals in their own natural habitats, animal experimentations are hosted in laboratories in universities, medical schools, government facilities and commercial facilities, and generally entail drug testing and other substances. They also include behavioural tests, such as those performed on dogs by Russian physiologist Ivan Pavlov in the early twentieth century.

According to data gathered by F. Barbara Orlans for her novel, *In the Name of Science: Issues in Responsible Animal Experimentation*, sixty percent of all animals used in testing are used for biomedical purposes and product-safety measures. The fact of this matter remains as is: the exploitation of innocent animals by research facilities. Right now, millions of rabbits, mice, rats, cats, dogs, primates, and other animals are kept locked away in barren cages all over the world, confined to a lifetime of sheer terror and the detrimental aches of loneliness. The lack of environmental enrichment they experience from suffering in these conditions influences these animals into developing neurotic behavioural issues—such as rocking back and forth, relentlessly spinning in circles, pulling out their own fur and biting themselves. These actions are a clear outcome of their stressful, traumatic living situations and can inherently damage or manipulate the test results.

People have different feelings towards animals; whether that be you view them as companions, athletes, entertainment

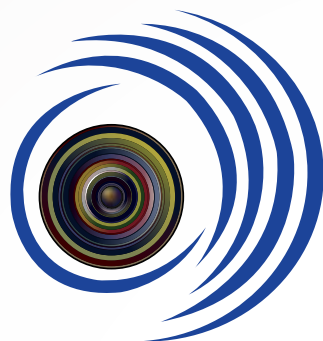
shticks or even transportation—however they are perceived doesn't change the fact that they are sentient beings with emotional and physical needs just like humans. And also just like humans, if these needs are not met accordingly, the results can be damaging to the point of causing negative side effects, such as the development of phobias, trust issues, separation anxiety, post-traumatic stress disorder and so on. Animals' rights are violated when they're used for research purposes, as they are reduced to being used as mere tools for the sake of human benefit. They are subjected to tests that are often painful or cause permanent damage or death, and they are never given the option of not participating in an experiment. As quoted by Tom Regan, a philosophy professor at North Carolina State University, he states the following: "animal experimentation is morally wrong no matter how much humans may benefit from it, because that animal's basic right has been infringed. Risks are not morally transferable to those who do not choose to take them."

Animals can't speak our language, and therefore can't vocalise their own preferences or decisions to us. By choosing their fate in laboratories, their rights are taken away without any thought to the well-being of their health or quality of their lives. The suffering they endure isn't worth the advantage for human research, and especially considering the procedures they undergo in order for scientists to retract this information for their studies. "The American Veterinary Medical Association defines animal pain as an unpleasant sensory and emotional experience perceived as arising from a specific region of the body and associated with actual or potential tissue damage." (Orlans, 1993)

Animals and humans experience pain very similarly, and their reactions to it are virtually identical (both scream, for example). Whilst those in favour of animal testing may believe it is acceptable because animals are a lower species

and lack the capacity to understand or exercise their rights, it cannot be justified on the terms that animals are lower on the evolutionary chart since they resemble human nature in so many ways. They possess internal systems and organs that are identical to the structures and functions of human organs, as well as feelings, thoughts, goals, needs and desires very similar to human functions and capacities. Tom Regan states that "animals are subjects to life just as human beings are, and a subject of life has inherent value." (Orlans, 1993) Thus, describing the impeccable fact that animals' lives should wholeheartedly be respected, and they should not be minimised because they're not considered to be 'human.'





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
