


DUNBOYNE COLLEGE SOCCER TEAM

PROGRESSION STORIES

The 2017 Dunboyne College graduates reached great heights with 216 getting honours degree Level 8 offers and 218 receiving Level 7 ordinary degree offers. Many received third level offers at both levels with a total of 274 achieving at least one offer. This does not include the many mature students who received early offers and those who took up offers in the UK for Nursing, Law or Sports. This year our students are in nearly every third level college in the country from Dublin to Dundalk, Athlone to Galway, Waterford Limerick. to As usual some of our local universities had the bulk of the offers. Forty four students

were offered First Arts in Maynooth, while seven Social Science, five Science and eight business offers were also made. Nearly all the eighty Maynooth University offers were taken up. There were also 19 offers to DCU, 10 to UCD and for DIT there were 20 offers at level 8 and 49 offers at levels 6 or 7. It was similar story for our local I.T. college in Blanchardstown, where there were 40 offers at Level 8 and a whopping 86 offers at Level 7 with the bulk being in Social Care, Business, Creative Media, Sports Management and Coaching, or Early Childhood Care and Education. Other IT colleges include 23 offers for Dundalk I.T., 10 for Athlone I.T., 9 for Tallaght I.T., 7 to IT Sligo and 6 for I.T. Carlow.

Distance proved no barrier to Dunboyne College students as from P.E. teaching in the University of Limerick, Pharmacy in Carlow, Veterinary Nursing in Athlone, to Sports Management in Waterford, Science in Galway, Arts in Cork or Psychology in Sligo, students travelled to access the exact course they wanted. Traditionally in Dunboyne many shop local with Maynooth University, IT Blanchardstown, DCU and D.I.T. still the most popular. Some do venture to the south side of the city with ten going to UCD to study Arts, Science, Agricultural Science, Food Science and Social Science. Some of our students opt for private colleges with 14 offers for Dublin Business School in 2017 and ten for Griffith College. Many students went to the UK this year to study nursing and many other graduates attainted immediate employment in areas like Childcare, Sports, Health Care, Business, Tourism and Professional Cookery.



Dunboyne College of Further Education has now grown to over 670 students doing QQI level 5 and 6 courses at our campus in Dunboyne Business Park. As well as being the only dedicated PLC further education college in County Meath and the surrounding areas, over 90% of the students who have achieved a full QQI level 5 award with Dunboyne College in recent years received third level offers. Many also proceed directly to employment as the skills achieved at QQI level 5 and 6 are much sought after by industries in this region. The feedback on the courses from students has been excellent in terms of the new skills and confidence they felt they received to go on to future learning and to access job opportunities. 96% of students rate the college as either excellent or very good in a 2017 student survey.

One year QQI level 5 Programmes like the majority run in Dunboyne are an ideal way to pursue a course in an area of interest and access a third level option. By having a day a week in a work experience setting, it allows students to see if they are pursuing the correct option before embarking on a four year degree course or entering a career. The flexible options in Dunboyne allow students to sample various modules in September to make sure they are pursuing the correct course choice. Students often do far better at further education level as they are now studying in an area of their passion and aptitude like Nursing, Sports, Childcare, Science or Cookery rather than in the Leaving cert where Irish English, Maths, etc. were compulsory. As students also learn referencing, research and selfdirected learning they tend to stay the full third level course afterwards, unlike many who go straight from Leaving Cert who are often not very sure of their options. Dropout rates for students who do a level 5 QQI course are less than 5% on progression compared to up to 33% on some courses for Leaving Cert entrants. Dunboyne courses are increasing in popularity with this year over 1,950 students applying for 600 places for 2017 entry.

This year the college introduces Applied Psychology, Sports Injury Prevention and Pre University Arts English (Liberal Arts) to add to the Equine Business, Airline Studies, Hairdressing,

Pharmacy Assistant, Beauty Therapy, Office Administration, Retail Studies, Computer Systems and Networks, , and Creative Media introduced in the last two years. . Dunboyne College since its inception in 2003 has run courses in Nursing, Social Studies, Art, Pre University Business and Pre University Arts programmes which have been added to over the years by students studying Childcare/ Special Needs Assistant, Health Service Skills, Pre-University Science, Food Science, Animal Care, Multimedia, Computer Information Systems, Sound Engineering, Sports Science, and Sports Management. The college continues to run its professional Cookery Course in conjunction with DIT and a wide range of level 6 second year programmes are also available.

Dunboyne College Open Evening this year runs from 6 pm until 8:30 pm on Thursday the 18th January where students and parents can visit each faculty and get first-hand information on each course and view the facilities. There is an on-line enrolment on-going with interviews on the 22nd January, 6th March and the 2nd of May. Late interviews are held in May, June and September. In fact, late applications will be taken until the end of September, depending on availability on the courses. School leavers, mature students, lifelong learners and those who want further opportunities to progress in their jobs will all benefit from these QQI programmes in nearby Dunboyne. It should never be thought about as an extra year, but rather as a year to explore what you really want to do, and a passport to make sure that it is possible.
