Students Win Scholarship Windfall of College Fees Reimbursement

This year DCFE introduced a scholarships programme that matches up a current Dunboyne College student with a company or organisation as that student's sponsor. He has offered two academic sponsorships to students, to the value of their course fees, from the Pre-University Business and Office Administration courses. Sean has been a peace commissioner and a supporter of a wide range of charity initiatives and continues to provide on-going support to the elderly in the Dunboyne community. Sean's charitable and valued sponsorship to Dunboyne College of Further Education is made in memory of his late daughter, Sandra, who passed away in 2018.

Dunboyne College had a successful Open Night on Thursday, 16th of January, 2020 when we opened our brand-new kitchen facilities and launched exciting new courses. The new kitchen in Dunboyne College opens up new opportunities in the culinary area. Lecturer from DIT, Tony Campbell, spoke on the night about links with TU Dublin into degree courses. The kitchen offers students the opportunity to train in a fit-for-purpose, fully equipped professional cooking facility. The current culinary students showed off their skills by providing tasty food on the night. Also new to the college is an excellent hair dressing facility and a science lab.

TD Helen McEntee attended the night to officially open the new, state-of-the-art, training kitchen. Ms McEntee congratulated the college on their massive achievements to date and pledged her continuing support in the college's need for a new building.

Principal Denis Leonard launched 12 new courses for the coming academic year 2020/21, including: Journalism, Digital Media and Public Relations, Forensic Science, Business and Accounting, Youth and Community Work, Office, Accounts, Administration and Information Processing, Architectural Technology and Design, Physiotherapy Studies, Art Portfolio with Fine Art and Design 2D Options, Pre-Paramedic Fire and Ambulance, Criminology and Psychology, Environmental Science and Animation.

Open Night was attended by up to 600 people interested in learning about the

college's many and varied courses. Visitors attended talks about the college, chatted with staff, toured the campus and had access to career guidance on the night.

There are now a whole range of places available to Dunboyne College graduates in certificate and degree courses in Maynooth University, DCU, DIT, IT Blanchardstown, DKIT, UCD, TCD, and with many other institutions around the country through the QQI Links Scheme. This year 350 of our students received offers to colleges all around the country, almost 300 of them at level 8.

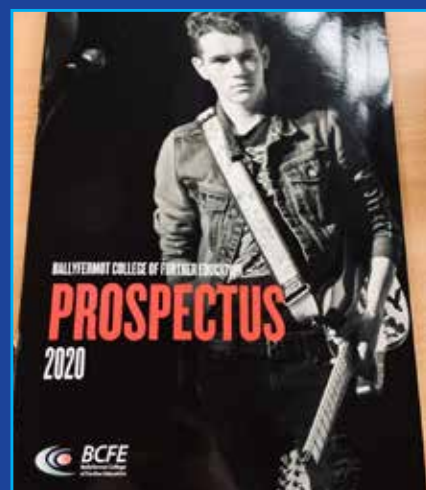
Many of the offers were to colleges in this region including 90 offers to Maynooth University, 29 to DCU, 15 to UCD, 116 to ITB, 97 to DIT, and 21 to Dundalk IT among others. In fact, that is 223 offers at levels 7 and 8 to the new Technical University 4 Dublin which has combined DIT, IT Blanchardstown and IT Tallaght. Dunboyne College continues to run a whole range of level 6 second year programmes in childcare, healthcare, animal science, equine business, multimedia, hairdressing, cookery and beauty therapy.

Legend of the Falls

Time was when a trip down the Falls Road in Belfast was fraught with much trepidation. A veritable warzone during the 30 years known as ‘the Troubles’, it remains a divided community. This is evidenced not just in 8-metre-high fortifications running through Belfast and other notorious flashpoints throughout Northern Ireland, but in the glaring polarity of the politics of both communities - Irish nationalists on one side and committed British unionists on the other.

We visited the peace wall at the notorious Falls/Shankill interface in West Belfast. Our host for the day, Mel Corry, works at Trademark, the anti-sectarian unit of the Irish Congress of Trade Unions (ICTU). Amidst an array of ‘soviet’ ephemera that included a portrait of Karl Marx and a bust of VI Lenin, he conducted an academic research workshop, somewhat ironically, on the importance of impartiality in investigative journalism. He reiterated the common misconception that the ‘Good Friday Agreement’ had delivered a peace

dividend to all sections of the community. He stated that while the security apparatus of the state (British Army helicopters, RUC Land Rovers, spooks and touts, etc.) has long receded into the past, relations between the communities along the ‘peace wall’ was prone to sporadic outbursts of violence. This necessitated the closing of gates between the two zones nightly, re-enforcing the ‘siege’ mentality of both communities. These days with the nationalist community enjoying numeric advantage over their unionist counterparts across Northern Ireland, the prevailing attitude now is less gerrymandering and more Gerry Adams. Mel gave us a tour of the murals at the international wall, many of which have a subtext that places the Irish struggle for freedom in an international context. In appropriating to themselves the legitimate struggles of social reformers as diverse as abolitionist, Frederick Douglass, Fidel Castro, Martin Luther King, and Nelson Mandela, republicans of ‘the left’ hope to assert the ‘legitimacy’ of their goal – a 32 county socialist nirvana. Other

murals dedicated to Bobby Sands and a pro-Israeli mural near loyalist Shankill, were decidedly more partisan. We visited the Garden of Remembrance, dedicated to fallen ‘volunteers’ who gave their lives in the cause of ‘freedom.’ It’s a stone’s throw away from the Royal Victoria Hospital, which, throughout ‘the Troubles’ was attended not just to ‘volunteers’, but to the innocents caught in the crossfire between the warring factions. Where, I wondered, was the memorial to the innocents? In the absence of an appropriate response, history is doomed to repeat itself.

Historical Tour of the Murals – Falls Road

The trip to Belfast to see the Falls Road murals was a lot more beneficial than I previously anticipated it would be and offered plenty of food for thought.

There were three murals in particular that stood out to me, the Palestinian mural, the anti-racism/bigotry mural and the Saoirse D'Eirinn mural calling for Irish/Catalan solidarity against oppression.

I think the reasons these murals stood out to me as much as they did is because of how oblivious I was to what was really going on.

It was very easy for me, nice and cozy in my house down the south to think that Nationalism, and the divide between Nationalists and Unionists up the North was a thing of the past, however that is far from the case, which is why I feel these three murals impacted me the most. These murals show that for Nationalists, the fight isn't over, they are no longer just interested in their own freedom or a United Ireland, they are aligning themselves with the fight for freedom throughout the world. They show their desire to fight for the oppressed and it made me realise their fight would never truly be over.

The walls and gates dividing the Falls and Shankill road are symbolic of the divide between Nationalists and Unionists, something I am afraid may never change.

Conflict is all the North has known, Nationalists and Unionists have been divided for decades and may never be able to live in true unity, that the relative ‘peace’ the North has at the moment is fragile, with tension still high and at risk at boiling over at any point.

Tackling the Irish environment

Ireland's fresh and green landscapes attract many tourists each year and our natural environment is renowned throughout the world. But is the Irish soil as clean as we think it is?

Due to global warming and economic problems, many countries are trying to have 100% renewable energy usage. At least 30 nations around the world already have 100% renewable energy contributions, but what about Ireland? In Ireland we use more than 14.4 million tons of oil equivalent. This is a major increase from the 9.8 million tons used during 1994.

Our energy consumption is rising year by year which is natural for a growing economy, but as a nation, and we aren't

achieving as much as our other EU counterparts. Shockingly, we are the joint second lowest in the EU. Germany, Sweden and the UK are a few of the many countries that are way ahead of us and are making a significant change.

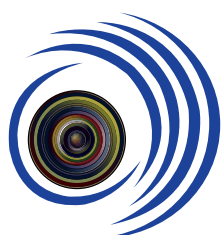
The Irish water is also questionable. During 2017, a whopping 21,657 Irish people were affected by Boil-Notices for their drinking water, which surprisingly, is a reduction from the 83,044 people affected by boil notices in 2016. This ridiculous amount of effect can cause any of us to hesitate to drink the Irish water ever again.

And as for the pollution? Breathing polluted air is thought to kill more than 1,100 people in Ireland each year. This

goes largely unnoticed. Many things are causing this. In 2016, 71 per cent of new cars were diesel the highest share of any European country. With all these diesel cars, there is more nitrogen oxide on the road and street. The same roads and street that is occupied with children and babies. And the government isn't doing anything about it.

With all of this information, we are only left to think of the Irish environment and how much work we have to do. This idea of Ireland being fresh and green is a myth that we need to expose.
